The 5 P's An Interventionist's Credo

- Peace is a spiritual gift and an ultimate aim for the good life
- People love is the first principle of life



- Personality attitude and perspective is all important
- Place home, family and community (love must have a focus, justice must have a space -- freedom)
- o Purpose is servant leadership

Casting as commissioning

Cast:

an act or instance of throwing something. The character of something. The visible shape or configuration of something. One's facial expression or features. A mold used to make an object by casting.

Commission:

"to unite, connect, combine; to bring together," from com "with, together" (see <u>com-</u>) + mittere "to release, let go; send, throw" (see <u>mission</u>).

Casting as commissioning

The Key to keeping people engaged and connected, that is, thriving in their work & life is summed up in the concept of PURPOSE. Purpose is one of the five P's that define the heroic arc of an Interventionist's journey from villain or problem, disappointment or failure to HERO or protector. It is central to what we formerly thought of as retention. We prefer the term now CASTING.

Casting as commissioning

Character is the consequence of trials faithfully overcome.

Action is the virtue of courage and wisdom combined

Service is the purpose at the heart of leadership

ogether is an attitude that amplifies our strength and expresses our ultimate desire for our community.



He is co-principal investigator for the Evaluation of Oakland's Measure Z Services, leads the Urban Institute's work under the Safety and Justice Challenge, and is a member of the leadership team for the Prison Research and Innovation Initiative. He was previously the principal investigator for the OJJDP- and NIJ-funded Developing a Research-Based Practice Guide to Prevent Youth Gun and Gang Violence project, Oakland Procedural Justice Principles for Police Officers project, and the Evaluation of Procedural Justice in Probation; the process and fidelity assessment lead for the evaluation of the National Initiative for Building Community Trust and Justice; and co-principal investigator for evaluations of the Los Angeles Gang Reduction and Youth Development program and the Chicago Violence Reduction Strategy.


