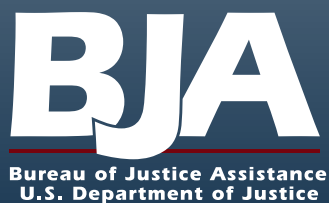

Introduction

The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) strives to provide criminal justice leadership and resources to support state, local, and tribal justice strategies to achieve safer communities. In pursuit of this mission, BJA has worked with countless criminal justice and public safety organizations and experts to provide expert, coordinated, and data-driven training and technical assistance (TTA). The provision of these services is made possible through assistance from organizations – the BJA TTA providers – with specialized knowledge of the criminal justice field.

In this spring 2018 edition of the BJA TTA Provider Directory, BJA compiled a comprehensive catalog of the 56 organizations currently funded by BJA to provide TTA to the field. The BJA TTA Provider Directory can be printed to use as a quick reference guide on your desk or shared with colleagues via email.

The information in the BJA TTA Provider Directory is self-reported and does not reflect an endorsement by BJA or the U.S. Department of Justice. However, the details, which include organization descriptions, criminal justice program areas, and implemented BJA-funded projects, will enable enhanced collaboration among BJA and criminal justice stakeholders and facilitate the coordination of TTA services. CRJ

The Crime and Justice Institute (CJI) at Community Resources for Justice (CRJ) works with national, state, local, and tribal criminal justice organizations to improve public safety and the delivery of justice throughout the country. CJI provides nonpartisan policy analysis, implementation consulting, capacity-building assistance, and research services to advance evidence-based practices and create systems-level change.

Some of CJI's major projects include:

- Working with states going through the Justice Reinvestment process, from policy development through implementation for both adult and juvenile systems;
- Supporting state and local jurisdictions in implementing evidence-based pretrial reform strategies;
- Collaborating with police departments on policy and management reforms and implementation of community policing; and
- Partnering with correctional systems looking to reshape their restrictive housing systems.

CJI is a division of CRJ. CRJ's mission is to change lives and strengthen communities by advancing policy and delivering individualized services that promote safety, justice, and inclusion. CRJ's work is organized along three areas of practice: Social Justice Services, which transitions ex-offenders back into mainstream society and diverts at-risk youth away from crime and toward a productive and fulfilling life; Community Strategies, which provides adults with intellectual disabilities a chance to grow and flourish in the community by offering residence in small, group home settings; and the Crime and Justice Institute

Concerns of Police Survivors, Inc.

C.O.P.S.

Each year, between 140 and 160 officers are killed in the line of duty, and their families and coworkers are left to cope with the tragic loss. Concerns of Police Survivors, Inc. (C.O.P.S.) provides resources to help them rebuild their shattered lives. There is no membership fee to join C.O.P.S., for the price paid is already too high.

C.O.P.S. was organized in 1984 with 110 individual members. Today, C.O.P.S. membership includes more than 37,000 survivors. Survivors include spouses, children, parents, siblings, significant others, and affected coworkers of officers killed in the line of duty according to federal government criteria. C.O.P.S. is governed by a National Board comprised of law enforcement survivors. All programs and services are administered by the National Office in Camdenton, Missouri. C.O.P.S. has more than 50 chapters nationwide that work with survivors at the grassroots level.

C.O.P.S. programs for survivors include the National Police Survivors' Conference, held each May during National Police Week; scholarships; peer support at the national, state, and local levels; the "C.O.P.S. Kids" counseling reimbursement program, "C.O.P.S. Kids" Summer Camp, and "C.O.P.S. Teens" Outward Bound experience for young adults; special retreats for spouses, parents, siblings, adult children, extended family, and coworkers; trial and parole support; and other assistance programs.

C.O.P.S. knows that a survivor's level of distress is directly affected by the agency's response to the tragedy. C.O.P.S., therefore, offers training and assistance to law enforcement agencies nationwide on how to respond to the tragic loss of a member of the law enforcement profession. C.O.P.S. is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization. C.O.P.S. programs and services are funded by grants and donations.

The on-the-ground training and assistance they provide helps state and local agencies translate the latest research into policy and practice. Their national and state-level convenings bring together colleagues from across the country to share their successes and challenges with the most pressing and complex issues facing the justice system today. Additionally, briefings they provide to top officials in Congress and the federal government result in legislation that enjoys broad, bipartisan support.

By taking the initiative, APPA has grown to become the voice for thousands of pretrial, probation, and parole practitioners and providers of services, including line staff, supervisors, and administrators from both the public and private sectors. Educators, volunteers, victim service providers, concerned citizens, and others with an interest in criminal and juvenile justice are also among APPA members.

Impact Justice is committed to reducing the number of people involved in the criminal justice system, improving conditions for those who remain incarcerated, providing meaningful opportunities for successful reentry, and attending to crime victims' needs.

Home to some of the foremost leaders in juvenile and adult criminal justice, violence prevention, research and evaluation, restorative justice, and youth development, Impact Justice provides an array of technical assistance to criminal justice and community stakeholders.
